Information Centre

Located in the Conference Centre Lobby, the Information Centre will be open for about one hour before and after services each day. A variety of information will be available about the area and events in Kelowna as well as the activities organized by the Church for the Feast. They will be happy to help answer your questions. Church literature will also be made available.

Business Office

The Business Office is located upstairs backstage. Office hours are one hour before and after services daily except on the Sabbath and Holy Days.

Etiquette for Services

Consider these guidelines, based on biblical principles of courtesy and respect:

Be on Time: While a few brethren will occasionally be late for varied, legitimate reasons, coming into services after they begin *by design* shows a measure of disrespect to both God and others. It can be a real distraction.

Hymns: Singing praises to God is the *actual beginning* of our services honoring God.

Loitering: While there may be reasons for a few people being out of the hall during services, such as parents comforting small children, those needing to use the restroom and possibly Church personnel (ushers or security), it is inappropriate to be fellowshiping during services.

Noise: If communication is needed, a written note or low whisper should be used so as not to distract others.

Children: Children are a great blessing! However, parents should focus on the need to train their children to sit or be occupied *quietly* during services. It does take work, effort and patience. If a child is being noisy, as parents we should remove the child from the hall, then tend to his or her needs.

Congregation's Response: On the other hand, as parents are working with their small children, we all should show patience and support for them.

Cell Phones: At the very least, phones should be put on silent or vibrate. If answering a phone is necessary, one should quickly but quietly leave the hall, then answer the call.

Computer/Video Games: Whether to allow any video games at services is a parental choice. However, many are not quiet and can be distracting. If a child is old enough to play a video game, he or she is likely old enough to learn from the service.

Our Conversation: Is our conversation before and after services befitting this special convocation of God with His people? *What* God hears us talking about is an important factor (Malachi 3:16).

Clothing: What kind of clothing is appropriate for an appearance before God? See an article on this in the September/October 2006 *United News*.

Applause for Special Music

“The United Church God, *an International Association* requests that you not applaud for sermonettes, sermons or special music during the Feast. One exception to this request *continues to be* the performance of the children’s choir. In general it can be shown that the Bible makes a distinction between music for worship and music for celebrating and entertaining. There is no biblical statement prohibiting applause, but since special music is a part of our service worshipping God, we request that you *refrain from applauding* and instead offer any encouragement or appreciation to the individuals on a personal level. A number of musicians and singers have stated a preference for no applause, wishing only to contribute to our worship of God. To those who feel this way, it is embarrassing to receive applause for their efforts.”

Merchandising

It is inappropriate to sell, display or distribute at our information tables or booths anything of a commercial or fund-raising nature. Only those materials approved by the Festival Coordinator may be distributed at the Feast sites. No other religious material, or any political materials, can be displayed or distributed at any Festival site of the United Church of God, *an International Association*.

Counselling and Anointing

Elders will be on duty 45 minutes before and after services daily in the counselling and anointing area in the foyer. At other times, please call your local pastor or one of the elders with your request. If you think you may have a contagious illness, please do not come to services to be anointed. Likewise, do not bring children with contagious illnesses to services or activities.

Housing

If you experience difficulties with your housing and have been unable to resolve them by talking with the management, please stop by the Information Centre to report the situation. We may be able to assist you and prevent a small problem from growing larger. Also, be sure to report any problems or other observations that will assist us in future housing negotiations.

Tax Refund for Visitors to Canada

Those who are visiting Canada may be eligible for a refund of the 7% Goods & Services Tax. Booklets explaining the details and containing the necessary forms are available at the Information Centre as well as in various shops in town.

Mothers’ Room

For the convenience of nursing mothers, a private area is available in the foyer of the theatre. This room should be used for the minimum amount of time needed to

feed your children and allow them to go to sleep. Please restrict your talking to that required for the needs of your infant. If older children must accompany you, please have them sit quietly and refrain from disturbing others. Attendants are on duty to assist you.

Parking

Parking at the feast in Kelowna is limited. The best option is to use the parkade located kitty-corner to the theatre. The cost for the parkade is fifty cents per hour or three dollars per day. Weekends and holidays are free. It helps to bring the right change. Public parking on the meters is limited to two hours. Only eight parking spots are available for us just behind the auditorium. Since we have so few places for handicap parking, you will have to negotiate for a space with Jose Varao, our parking attendant, who will be in the back lot before and after services.

Housing Reservations for 2007

Please do not make housing reservations for next year at this time. Contracts for festival sites and housing are generally not negotiated until later in the year. When reservations have already been made, our negotiations for better rates are severely handicapped. Thank you in advance for your co-operation!

Housing Survey

Tuesday, October 10, the Housing Surveys will be distributed. Each head of household should fill one out. This information greatly assists in future negotiations and provides legitimate feedback to the hotels. Return your completed Housing Survey form to an usher or the information desk.

Feast Video

This year's Feast of Tabernacles sermon video is titled: "Life Anew in a New Land." The special presentation will have three main sections. These will include a message from President Clyde Kilough about our goals for the future; an interesting focus on the brethren and the work in Australia and New Zealand (including visits to Brisbane, Sydney, Melbourne and Auckland); and a Feast sermon message from Australian minister Stephen Clark—all looking forward to God's Kingdom: "life anew in a new land."

The video will feature an inspirational message of confident hope for the future civilization that God's people envision—a spiritual freedom in a new society led by Jesus Christ. It will exhort our brethren to continue fighting the good fight of faith in their daily lives as they await Christ's return and the establishing of that life anew in a new land—similar to Abraham's quest outlined in Hebrews chapter 11, verses 10 through 16. The sermon portion by Mr. Clark will draw an analogy between the coming, new civilization of God to this earth, and the new civilization that the early Australians forged as they sought freedom in a new land. The sermon video will be approximately 65 minutes in length.

Policy for Announcements

All announcements with the exception of emergency announcements should be prepared and handed in for typing thirty minutes before services. Announcements should be legible and pertinent. Announcements for prayer requests will generally be posted in the Information Booth area.

Festival Youth Instruction

Classes will be for children K-1, 2-3 and 4-6th grades. The first lesson, on Sunday, October 8th, will be an overview of the meaning of the Feast of Tabernacles and how it directly affects our children today and in the World Tomorrow. The second lesson, on Thursday, October 12th will be on God's Plan for His family by going through all the Holy Days. We look forward to sharing our lessons with your children.

Instructions will be given on the days of the lessons after the initial hymns are sung and an opening prayer is given. We ask that parents escort their children to the front lobby at that time and then pick them up in the same location immediately after services are over.

Cybercasting

We're pleased to announce that we'll be broadcasting all Feast of Tabernacles services from Kelowna live via the Internet. We'll provide an audio as well as a video broadcast. The video is best viewed with a high speed Internet connection, but it will also work for people with a 56K modem as the video broadcast will be dual speed. The video via a 56K modem will be more of a slide show rather than TV quality as received with a high speed connection. Other features available will be an E-Bible and E-Hymnal.

The cybercast crew will be providing several camera angles so that you can experience the Feast up close with the best possible coverage without actually being there. For better viewing we recommend you try our video broadcast in full screen mode by pressing **Ctrl+3** or by selecting **View – Full Screen Theatre** from the Real Player menu.

All messages from Kelowna will be archived so you don't have to worry about missing them. Sermon tapes will no longer be handed out for local church libraries. The messages can be downloaded.
